Raising Standards for Consumers

ANEC's right to submit an Opinion on draft standards



Background

The broader use of standards in European legislation and policies of public interest makes the participation of societal stakeholders more crucial than ever in ensuring that standards are robust and able to serve the interests of industry and society.

Regulation (EU) 1025/2012 foresees a more inclusive European Standardisation System (ESS) and some welcome changes have taken place since its entry into force in 2013.

Among these is the decision of CEN-CENELEC to grant the three European societal stakeholders organisations (SSOs), recognised under Annex III of Regulation 1025, **the right to submit an Opinion** on draft standards submitted to the Enquiry or Formal Vote. These organisations represent consumers (**ANEC**), environmental interests (ECOS) and workers (ETUC).

The right to submit an Opinion was implemented on 1 January 2017.

The right to submit an opinion

The decision on the adoption of a European Standard (EN) remains with the national members of CEN-CENELEC through the national delegation principle. Hence ANEC needs to continue to lobby at the national level.

Nevertheless, the Opinion allows each SSO to express whether it supports adoption of the standard through a "Favourable" or "Not Favourable" statement, accompanied by comments as needed. It is an additional right that does not affect the usual commenting process, nor the right to send comments on a draft standard during its development.



How it works

An SSO is not required to submit an Opinion on every draft standard and, indeed, is encouraged to submit an Opinion only where it contributed to the development of a standard. Moreover, the Opinion does not remove the right of an SSO to appeal against ratification of a newly-adopted standard.

Opinions are sent to the Technical Committee (TC) responsible for the standard. Where an EN is adopted on the vote of CEN-CENELEC members, but at least one Opinion from an SSO is not supportive ("Not Favourable"), the TC must consider the justification provided and advise the parent Technical Board (BT). If the TC agrees with the justification, it should propose an action to the BT.

Opinions will be recorded in the summary of voting results published at the close of the Enquiry or Formal Vote.
