Introduction

The provision of official statistics has become increasingly important over the years in order to inform policy and monitor progress for pan-EU initiatives. To effectively inform decision-making, data must be harmonised across countries to ensure comparability. It is in this context that the European Statistical Programme (ESP) operates as the framework for the development, production and dissemination of statistics. Its role is to ensure that the European Statistical System (ESS) continues to be the leading provider of high-quality statistics in Europe. To this end, the ESP aims to achieve the following objectives:

- 1. To provide statistical information in a timely and cost-effective manner;
- 2. To implement new methods of production of statistics to increase efficiency and improve quality;
- 3. To strengthen partnership within the ESS and beyond in order to further increase its productivity;
- 4. To ensure statistics are delivered in a consistent manner and can quickly adapt to new priorities.

The present consultation will inform the final evaluation of the implementation of the ESP to be presented to the European Parliament and the European Council.

The death certificate - and hospital discharge statistics collected at EU-level lack precision as to the place of injury event (accident/ act of violence); the circumstances leading to the injury event; the product involved; and (for discharges) the severity of the injury.

In many of the Member States more detailed information is available and it is a loss of quality to neglect that at EU-level.

An EU register of consumer product-related accidents and injuries is missing.

The lack of a pan-European consumer product-related accidents and injuries database makes it difficult to assess where legislative or standardisation measures are needed and to assess the success of measures taken.

Targeted prevention needs data about the frequency and severity of injuries, as well as on the concerned population group and circumstances. Without reliable information on risk factors, evidence-based priorities regarding population groups, products or settings cannot be set.

In November 2020, ANEC joined forces with EuroSafe to call for a revitalisation of the European Injury Database (EU-IDB) in a common position paper, "EUROPEAN CONSUMER SAFETY NEEDS SOLID INJURY DATA" (https://bit.ly/2Jy6eYE) and infographic (https://bit.ly/3eIA3RL).

The 2020 paper is a follow-up of the joint call from 2013 "THE NEED FOR A PAN-EUROPEAN ACCIDENT AND INJURY DATA SYSTEM" (https://bit.ly/35RXfcd) by more than thirty EU social and economic umbrella organisations, including ANEC.
